Program: the Life and Music of Tom Lehrer

Speaker: Mike Leavitt and Crew

Tom Lehrer is a talented and funny satirist and commentator of mid-twentieth-century American politics, culture, and social taboos.

He is quoted as saying, "I went from adolescence to senility, trying to bypass maturity." His life's theme seem sometimes to be, "You can't be satirical and not be offensive to someone."

He was pretty hilarious though, so no one minded.

Most of his fame, however, came from his music. He wrote his own music and accompanied himself on the piano. His lyrics and music inspired a generation of musical satirists.



Mike will talk about the life of Lehrer, and, along with friends John Downey, Dave Thomas, Marianne Tagge, and Jim Grefer will croon a few of his tunes.

A resident of Potomac Ridge, Mike received his Ph.D. in Political Science from Northwestern University, and a Masters in Jewish Studies from the Baltimore Hebrew University. He spent most of his career as a scientist at the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency.

Mike retired and moved to Lansdowne Woods in 2005 with his wife Eva. He serves as Treasurer of the PR HOA and is a member

of its Budget and Finance committee, sings in the "Notables," the LWVA choir, teaches an adult class in Jewish studies, and is co-chair of the weekly "Great Courses" discussion group. He has been an active member of the Blue Ridge Torch Club since 2008.

January Program Summary: A Newfoundland and Labrador Adventure

Joyce Mitchell, Pat Monahan, Anne A Thomas, and Bill Thomas spent eleven days on a Road Scholar trip and each presented part of their experiences. They all shared their experience in this special Torch talk.

Anne Thomas presented her knowledge of the geography and geology of Newfoundland and Labrador. These are the easternmost part of North America and the shortest distance between North America and Europe and, because of this, many Marconi Towers were built to provide early wireless communications to Europe. For the same reason, early transatlantic flights also originated in Newfoundland.

Interestingly, Newfoundland is where the theory of plate tectonics was proven. The Tablelands in Gros Morne National Park are composed of mantle rock that came from 18,750 feet below the earth surface dur-

ing the collision of plates. It is one of two places on the earth where you can find mantle rock on the surface.

Pat Monahan talked about local hero Wilfred Grenfell who was sent in 1892 to Newfoundland as a medical missionary. He worked tirelessly to provide medical services to the inhabitants of Newfoundland and Labrador and had a medical ship that could go from location to location. He worked tirelessly to raise money to build hospitals and medical services to improve the lives and health of the local fisherman.

No history of the area is complete without the Vikings. **Bill Thomas** shared with us how the Vikings arrived in Newfoundland at L'Anse aux Meadows around 1000 A.D., establishing a

settlement to acquire resources such as timber and ore and used the settlement for around 10 years. Although local Viking stories had spoken of the settlement, its location was not discovered until the 1960s.

Finally, **Joyce Mitchell** gave us the story of Battle Harbour Historic Trust, Labrador. Battle Harbour is a restored 19th-century fishing village on a small island in the Labrador Sea. Regarded by generations as the unofficial capital of Labrador, it was once the salt fish capital of the world. Dr. Grenfell built the first Labrador hospital and a church on this island in 1893.

All in all, a fascinating set of presentations.

Annual dues for Regular Members and Household Members (second member in the same household) are established by the IATC Board each year. 
